#### Eligibility Criteria:

- Primary residences only
- Owned and occupied the property during 2024
   Hurricanes and still own the damaged home

#### Minimum/Maximum Assistance:

- Rehabilitation: Up to \$250,000\*
- Reconstruction and/or elevation: Up to \$450,000

#### Program Requirements:

- Homeowners must occupy property as primary residence (i.e., homestead exemption) and maintain homeowner's insurance for five (5) years
- If in a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA), homeowner must obtain and maintain flood insurance (NFIP) in perpetuity

#### Recapture Provision:

 Assistance is secured via a 5-year mortgage and promissory note with a declining balance amortized annually until forgiven







# Looking Ahead: Buyout and Safe Housing Program



Home buyouts in repetitive loss and flood-prone areas.





#### Who Can Apply:

- Home was damaged in the 2024 Hurricanes and meets FEMA's definition of a Repetitive Loss property
- Home was owned and occupied as a primary residence

#### Application Process:

 Priority will be to LMI households earning at or below 80% AMI, as defined by HUD. Assistance may also be available to non-LMI households.

#### Eligible Activities:

- Voluntary buyout of homes at pre-disaster fair market value
- Demolition and site clearance
- Environmental cleanup (if necessary)
- Site restoration for open space, floodplain management, or recreation
- Assistance with reasonable moving expenses

#### Available Assistance:

- Payout based on pre-disaster market value of home
- Up to \$450,000 per household (including Incentive)

#### Safe Housing Incentive

- Up to \$50,000 to help secure new housing (purchase or rent)
- Available to those relocating outside flood-prone areas (SFHA or flood zone)
- Based on income to ensure new housing costs do not exceed 35% of monthly income







### Looking Ahead: Rental Recovery Program



Rehabilitation, reconstruction, and/or elevation of rental units with seven (7) or fewer units. Managed and administered directly by County staff.

#### Who Can Apply:

#### Property owners who:

- Owned the rental unit(s) during the 2024 Hurricanes
- Are free from active code or law enforcement complaints
- Still own rental units damaged during the 2024 Hurricanes

#### Application Process:

 Applications processed in the order received, as determined complete and eligible

#### Available Assistance:

- Up to \$250,000 for repairs per unit
- Up to \$450,000 for reconstruction and/or elevation per unit





#### Eligible Activities:

- Repairing, rebuilding or replacing seriously damaged or destroyed units
- Elevating or rebuilding units in flood-prone areas

#### Program Requirements

- Assistance provided as a forgivable loan (10 years for repairs;
   20 years for reconstruction)
- Loan require no payments as long as:
  - Repaired unit rent doesn't exceed HOME Fair Market Rent values, and may only be long-term leased
  - Repaired units are only leased to tenants up to 80% AMI
  - Tenants for repaired units must prove Florida residency







## Looking Ahead: Infrastructure Recovery & Resiliency Program



Repair, replacement, or improvement of infrastructure and facilities. Projects awarded to municipalities based on allocations.

#### Minimum/Maximum Assistance:

- County Projects:
  - Maximum: \$50,000,000 per project
  - Minimum: \$500,000 per project
- Municipality Projects: Limits to be determined for each municipality based on allocation
  - Minimum: \$100,000 per project

#### Program Requirements:

- Each municipality (County representing unincorporated areas)
  receives an allocation based on population. Projects awarded
  through an application process, with proposals evaluated for
  eligibility, LMI benefit, and alignment with County evaluation criteria.
- Projects without disaster tieback may be funded with mitigation setaside (up to 15% of the allocation)
- County to prepare project recommendations for BCC approval



#### Eligible Activities:

- Repair, rehabilitation, mitigation, and resilience upgrades to critical infrastructure systems, including flood control and drainage improvements; water and sewer facilities; and stormwater management systems.
- Acquisition, rehabilitation, construction, reconstruction and/or hardening of eligible public facilities that support community services, emergency response, and longterm recovery.







### Looking Ahead: Infrastructure Match Program



Awarding the non-Federal cost share requirement for infrastructure projects to the municipalities. County staff to provide oversight, technical assistance, and compliance support.

#### Eligible Activities:

- Grants to satisfy non-Federal cost share for projects funded by other Federal agencies including FEMA, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), and Federal Transit Administration (FTA)
- Projects must comply with all Federal statutory cross-cutting requirements (e.g., Davis-Bacon, Environmental Reviews) that apply to CDBG-DR funds
- CDBG-DR can not pay for costs reimbursable by, or for which funds are made available by, FEMA or USACE

#### Minimum/Maximum Assistance:

- Maximum: \$5,000,000 per project
- Minimum: \$150,000 per project

#### Program Requirements:

- Open to Manatee County municipalities only
- Projects must have a tieback to 2024 Hurricanes
- Municipalities will submit applications/funding requests to County for evaluation of capacity, community need, project scope, leveraged funds, and LMI benefit
- County to prepare award recommendations for final BCC approval
